- A new fence was constructed at Adventure Camp to ensure the animals who live on site are safe and can be viewed easily during program at camp. Enrichment structures were added to the pens for the animals to engage with.
 - 4 new covered pavilions were added to camp ensuring there is a dry and shady space for programs.
 - Hidden Bay Leadership Camp grounds were resurfaced and landscaped making it more accessible.
 - In February of 2023 our management team embarked on a journey to expand our indigenous knowledge and relationships in the community.
 - Supported some 314 full and part-time employees and Home Child Care Providers in delivering quality care and education.
 - A new software program was developed and piloted at a few locations as our current software was going to be obsolete as of January 2024.
 - Recognized and celebrated Family Literacy Day with activities and family engagement.
 - An application for CWELCC expansion was submitted for 52 new spaces at Our Lady of Good Counsel to support kindergarten families.
 - Celebrated International Mud Day.
 - Celebrated our second annual Winter Solstice event for families and communities.
 - We were awarded the bid to operate a new child care centre in Aurora - set to open in fall of 2024.
 - Supported community by participating in Holiday gatherings including Holiday Parades, unique town gatherings and events.
 - Collected 1320 lbs of food during the Agency Holiday Drive donating to the Newmarket Food Pantry and \$1000.00 cash donation to Aurora Food Pantry from YPCE’s “Toonie Jean Friday”.
 - Hosted our fifth Holiday Celebration for staff presenting 24 rings to employees celebrating 5 to 30 years of service.
 - York Professional Care & Education hosted our 9th annual job fair, as well as participating in community college employment fairs.

- York Professional Care & Education will host the 10th annual job fair.

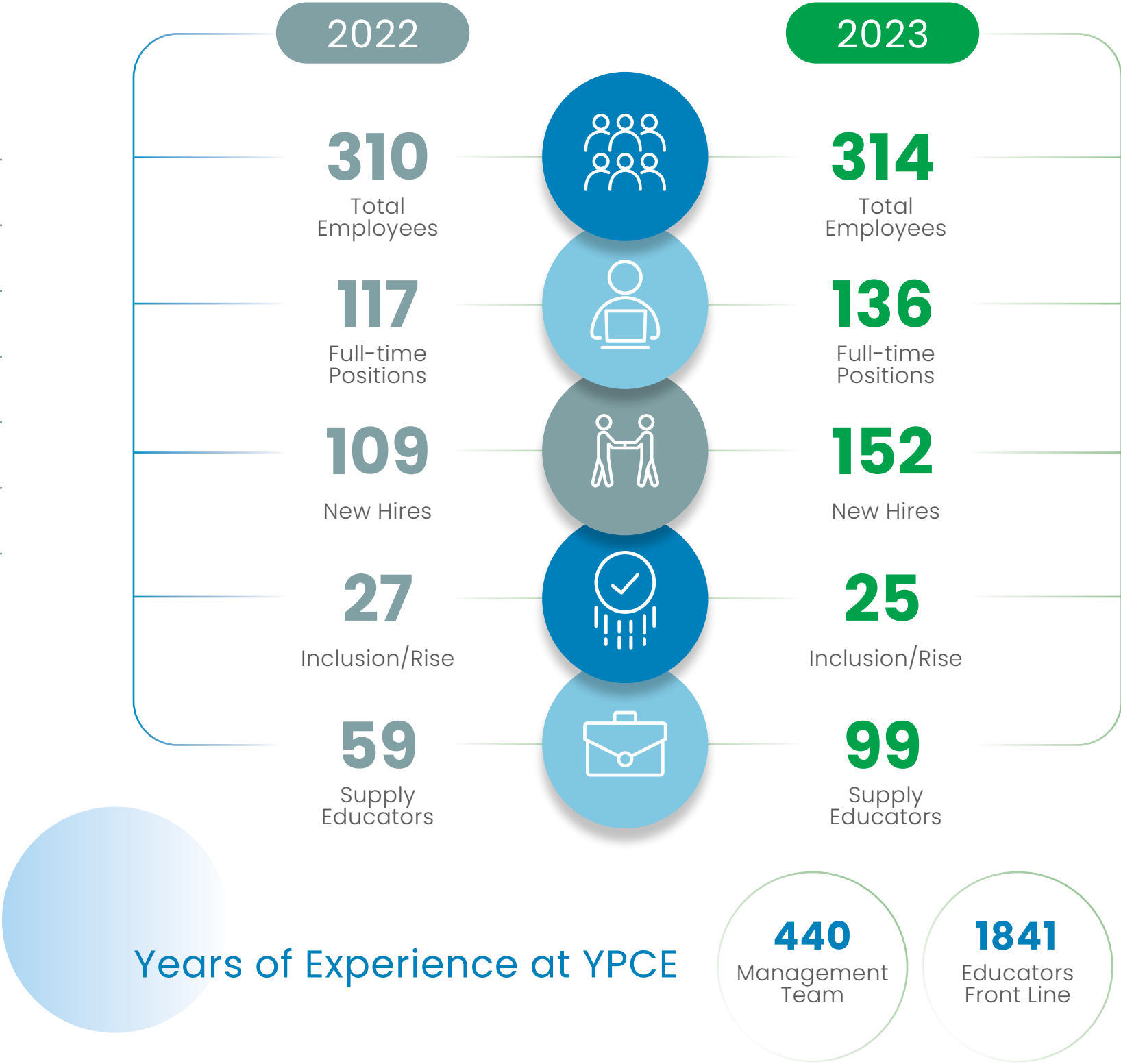

Outdoor Documentation from Hewitt’s Creek

● Cultivating Reciprocity with Nature and Living Things

I have since been interested in learning about the ways we are cultivating reciprocal relationships between humans and the earth in Early Years Programs. What are we teaching our children about our place on earth, interconnectivity, reciprocity, gratitude, consumerism, etc. What stories do we choose to tell? The following is a story from a short visit with the Preschoolers and their Educators at York Professional – Hewitt’s Creek.

● They considered the well-being of other creatures...

As children settled into their play, a young voice echoed through the forest: “A turtle! We found a turtle!” Children hurried to gather around the discovery and they quickly began theorizing. “This must be the turtle we startled yesterday as we were heading into the forest!”, “It’s so deep in the forest, it must be lost and afraid.” “It’s hiding in its shell, it must be scared” As they studied the turtle’s shell, they wondered what kind of turtle it must be, what environment they should be living in, what they ate, and how they could help. A quick Google search by an educator helped them identify the turtle and determine that its ideal environment is near water. This was a dilemma, should they leave the turtle alone and let it make its way back to the pond on its own? The pond was reasonably far away for a little turtle. Or should they take the turtle to the pond and spare it the journey back? Through a democratic approach, it was decided that they would carry the turtle in a container and release it into the pond. They all took one last look and the turtle was released to join its family in the pond. “Yay!” exclaimed one child as another expressed their sadness for parting ways with their new friend. I wonder if their paths will cross again.

Operational & Financial

By the end of 2023 all of the agency’s child care centres were fully enrolled with wait lists as a result of the enrollment in the Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care (CWELCC) program that started in 2022. CWELCC is a 4 year program for child care providers to be used to reduce child care fees for families with the goal to bring the average daily rate for child care for children under 6 to be \$10.00.

In addition to a generous benefit program and an enhanced registered retirement savings plan, the Agency established a Tuition fund at the end of the year in order to reward academic achievement and to support eligible dependent(s) of YPCE employees to pursue further education at a post-secondary level.

The additional staff wages and benefits was partially funded by the provincial initiative designed to enhance compensation for those working within Licensed Child Care. This has been an ongoing initiative. Additional base funding continued to be received and was given directly to Home Child Care Providers significantly enhancing their compensation.



The Agency continues to receive additional funding from the Region of York and The County of Simcoe to provide additional employment opportunities as well as Special purpose funding to enhance the programs offered.

The strong fiscal performance will enable additional funds to be added to the existing Contingency and Property and Building improvement funds in the coming year. These restricted funds were established to cover any funding shortfalls in the future, unanticipated major costs and to finance any future capital investments.

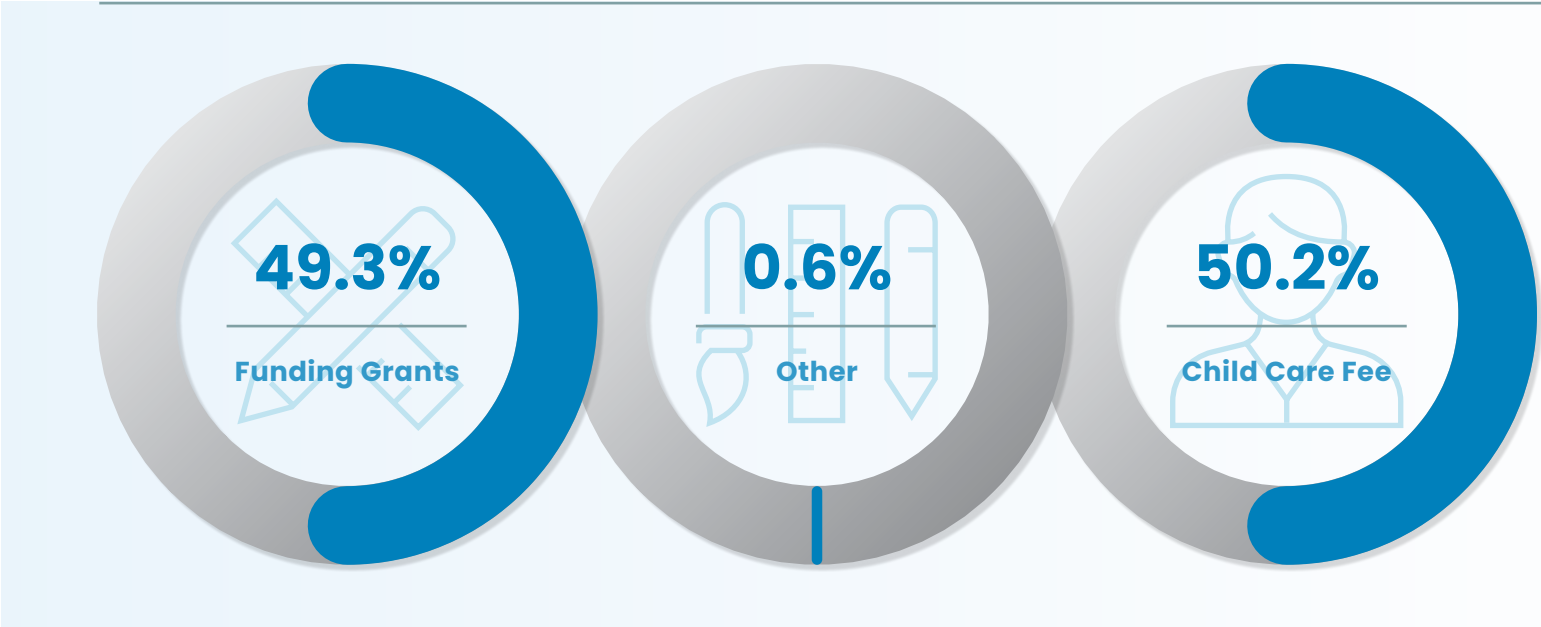

Revenue and Expenditures

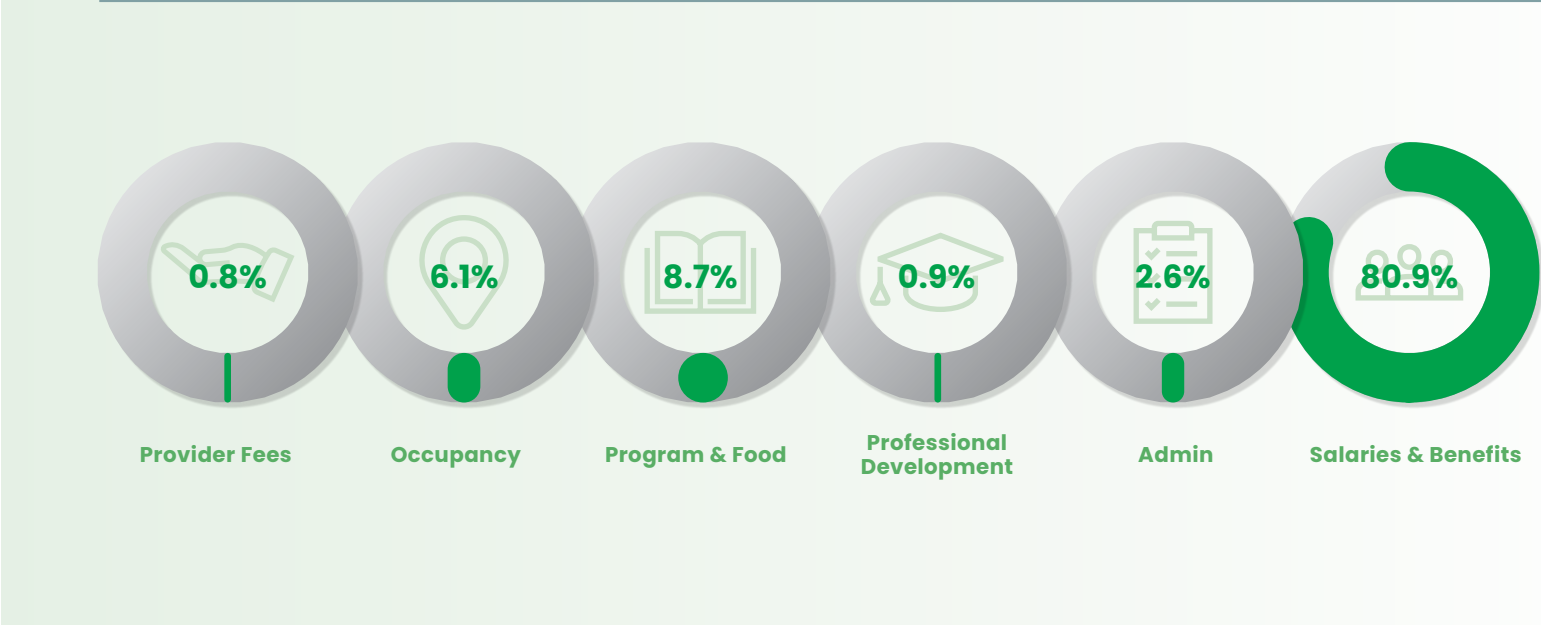
Revenue

Camp Initiatives

● Hidden Bay Leadership Camp

Summer 2023 at Hidden Bay was one of laughter, smiles, stories, friends and of course s'mores! With both day and overnight campers, ranging in age from 4 to 16, Hidden Bay is a place for children across Ontario to meet, learn new skills, build friendships and connect with the land. Our connection to our community grew in 2023, as we welcomed a new partnership with Wasauksing First Nation, in addition to our partnerships with Shawanaga First Nation, York Region, Parry Sound District Social Services Administration Board, Sudbury Manitoulin Children's Foundation and Amici Children's Camping Charity. The staff team is what makes Hidden Bay so special, and in 2023, we welcomed 5 international staff to our team from England, Ireland and Scotland. These staff members bring a once in a lifetime opportunity for campers to learn about different cultures and communities, while introducing these visitors to a traditional Canadian summer camp experience.

● Adventure Camp

Adventure Camp 2023 summer was a year of warm days, lots of exploration, and tons of camp spirit. Adventure camp with a team of 23 counsellors, lifeguards, program leads offered an amazing summer to 100 campers daily. We had a large number of returning counsellors for their second, third and fourth summers, and welcomed in some new counsellors with new skills to offer the camp. In 2023 we added new structures to the camp, including our group pavilions that offer a shaded, sheltered space from the sun and elements on rainy days. Our farm area continues to grow with our permanent farm friends (pigs, goats, sheep, and chickens) that the campers learn to care for, feed, and offer stimulation activities for. We look forward to 2024 with plans for future exploration area development that supports the camper's experience of the land and connection to the natural world.

● Nature Connections and Forest School Fridays

Hosted at Adventure Camp A day in the forest listening to the birds, singing songs, jumping in muddy puddles, and connecting to the land is what the Nature Connections program is all about. Children ages 0 to 6, along with their caregiver enjoy the morning outdoors each week, all season long.

The groups were led by our team of Forest School Practitioner Educators that are passionate about engaging children outdoors. The seasons created many new learning opportunities, for example, in the fall the children explored the changing of the leaves, and how the animals of the forest were starting to prepare for winter. We hiked longer hikes with the cooler temperatures and explored in the mud kitchen making forest burgers and other treats. In the beauty of winter, the fun doesn't stop as we explore the first snow, how ice forms on the tops of puddles and on little lake. We explored tools to whittle carrots and left the shreds for the animals to feast upon in the forest. In spring when the rain has filled the puddles, we built resilience as we explored in



all weather, making trenches, and floating boats down the waterways. We watched as the spring color came back to the environment and buds started to grow. The Nature Connections program is a special place for children and their caregivers to connect to themselves, to others, and to the natural world.

Forest School Fridays was a new program that started in September 2023, to support kindergarten aged children with an alternative Friday program outdoors on the land. The group started with just 5 children, and eventually ended at a full group of 12 children. Offered by our Forest School Practitioners this was a program that supported training practitioners to develop skills and understanding of Forest School philosophy. The program operated all seasons from our traditional Mongolian Yurt with the warmth of the wood burning stove in the winter months. The children in this program indulged in deeper forest explorations linking Ontario curriculum concepts, developing skills in bush craft, lighting fires, tool use and nature arts including sewing, weaving and paper making.



Programs at York Professional Care and Education

York Professional Care & Education recognizes children as competent, capable complex thinkers rich in potential. As co-learners, educators facilitate experiences that encourage children to be challenged in their daily play, expand on their interests and explore the natural world in all seasons and weather. Together with families, educators ensure every child is provided an inclusive and barrier free meaningful program, recognizing the Four Foundations of How Does Learning Happen? – Belonging, Well-being, Engagement and Expression.

● **Child Care Centres** – In our full-day child care environments, programs are developed through emergent experiences supporting children's interests, inquiries and development. Programs provide all children opportunities to engage with loose parts and natural materials both indoors and outdoors, with an emphasis on exploring outdoor natural spaces in the beyond. Through this play-based approach, children can explore and interact with materials alongside peers; or independently, with the support of educators as facilitators and co-learners. We believe that exposing children to natural spaces early, develops a lifelong relationship and respect for the environment instilling a commitment to be stewards of it.

● **Before & After School Programs** – Educators facilitate experiences that provide autonomy for children to be independent thinkers. School aged children have the opportunity to engage in a club-like environment where they socialize with friends and explore and initiate activities that interest them. School age programs are equipped with materials and supplies for various activities including sports and games, projects and skill building opportunities. An emphasis is placed on utilizing outdoor spaces for exploration and learning in all Canadian weather where children gain a respect for the natural environment and develop the attitude for being stewards of it.

● **Licensed Home Child Care** – In a home care environment, Care Providers set up spaces for children to engage with their surroundings indoors and out. In a small group setting, a care giver recognizes individual and group needs and interests establishing daily routines that supports the development of young children. Interactions provide a sense of security and care, while activities provide the opportunities for group and individual play including music, books, sensory, motor activities, skill development and exploration of natural spaces outdoors and into the community.



● **Exploration Camp** – On-site day camps are conveniently located at our centre-based community schools, providing fun filled outdoor focused camp experiences. Weekly sessions offer campers the opportunity to connect with friends daily, and engage in a variety of camp activities including exploring outdoor natural spaces, tool use, sports, creative experiences, and community field trips. With an emphasis on outdoor activities, camp connects children to natural elements developing an attitude of respect for the environment and the caring of it.

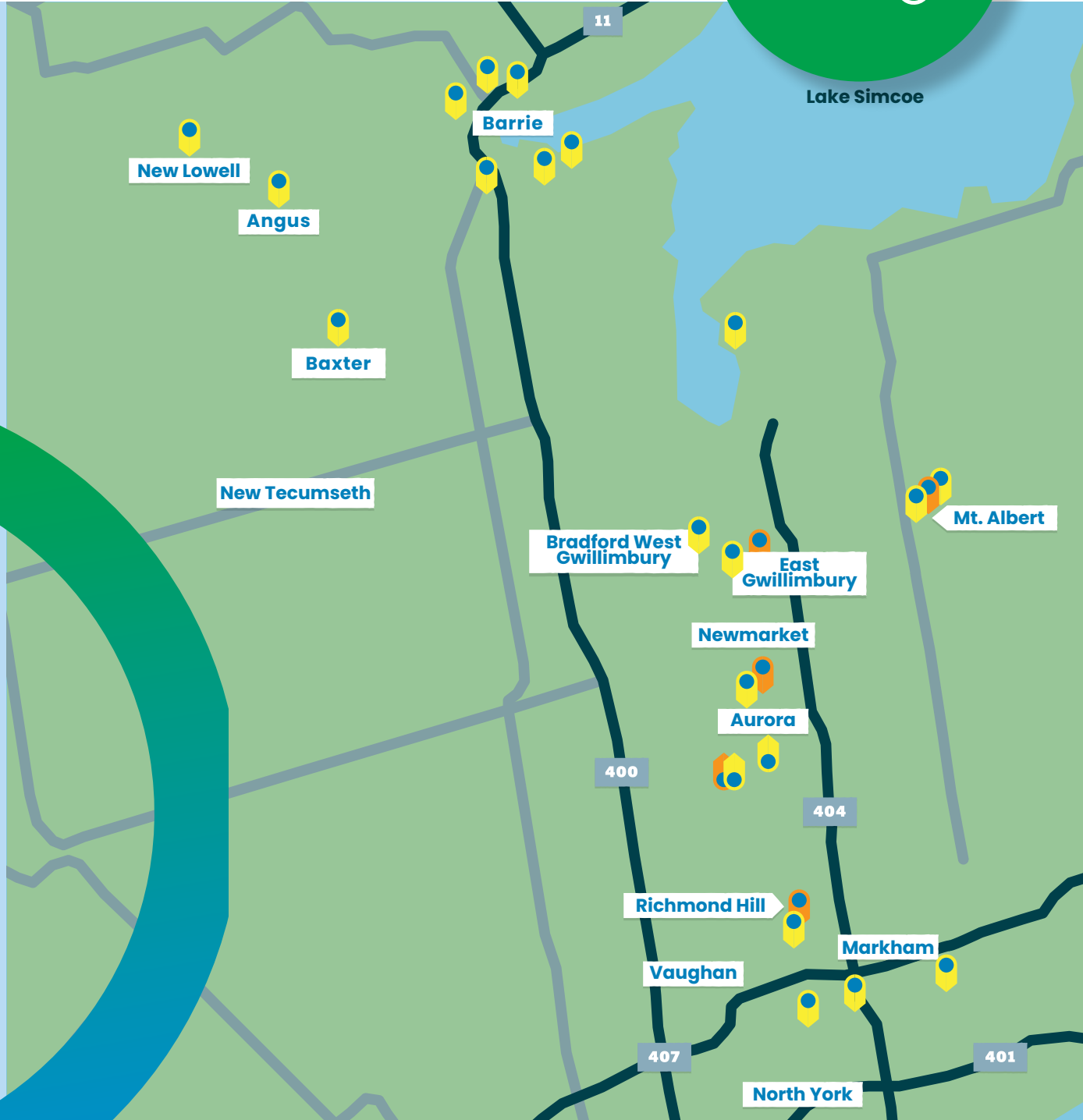
● **Adventure Camp** – An OCA accredited day camp located on 48 acres of farmland property in Mount Albert, Adventure Camp provides lasting connections between children and the natural world. Full day, outdoor experiences include: farm club, swimming, pond life, tool use, mud kitchen, gardening, fort building, archery and so much more. These experiences in the natural outdoor spaces inspire children to appreciate the environment and the camps agricultural heritage. Together in small groups, counsellors and campers build relationships with each other, peers and nature.

● **Hidden Bay Leadership Camp** – An OCA accredited overnight camp near Parry Sound, Hidden Bay is surrounded by the rhythms of natural spaces on Lake Shebeshekong where campers build lasting relationships and connections with the natural world, and learn to be stewards of it. At Hidden Bay, we strive for children to develop self-reliance and confidence with the support of camp counsellors in a safe and respectful, inclusive community. Daily, campers are encouraged to develop the habit of setting goals and acquiring leadership skills while engaging in traditional camp experiences including water sports, archery, eco adventures, games and campfire, making memories and friendships that last a lifetime.

● **Nature Connections** – Guided by YPCE Certified Forest & Nature School Practitioners, Nature Connections provides children, families and caregivers the opportunity to immerse in outdoor experiences on our 48 acres of natural spaces.

Participants come prepared for a morning outdoors to explore activities that include short hikes, play spaces with natural materials and loose parts, mud kitchen, fire building & cooking, creative experiences, story-telling, songs and so much more. Sessions are held in fall, winter and spring offering families the opportunity to integrate nature into their everyday life, learn about Forest School values and principles, connect with a like-minded community and build new relationships.
